Discussion notes

 The image on the left shows different animals of different shapes and sizes doing different things, with a message that everyone moves at a different pace and the importance of honouring your mind/body and moving in the way that feels best for you.

- The image on the right shows Ursula (the one with the white, short hair) and Ariel (the one with the red, long hair) looking at each other. In the movie, "The Little Mermaid", Ursula is shown as an evil character and Ariel is shown as a hero character.
- Key message 1 This is an example of how some media show evil characters with larger bodies and hero characters with smaller, and often unrealistic or idealized body types.
- Key message 2 Media can influence how we think about our own bodies and our self-worth.
